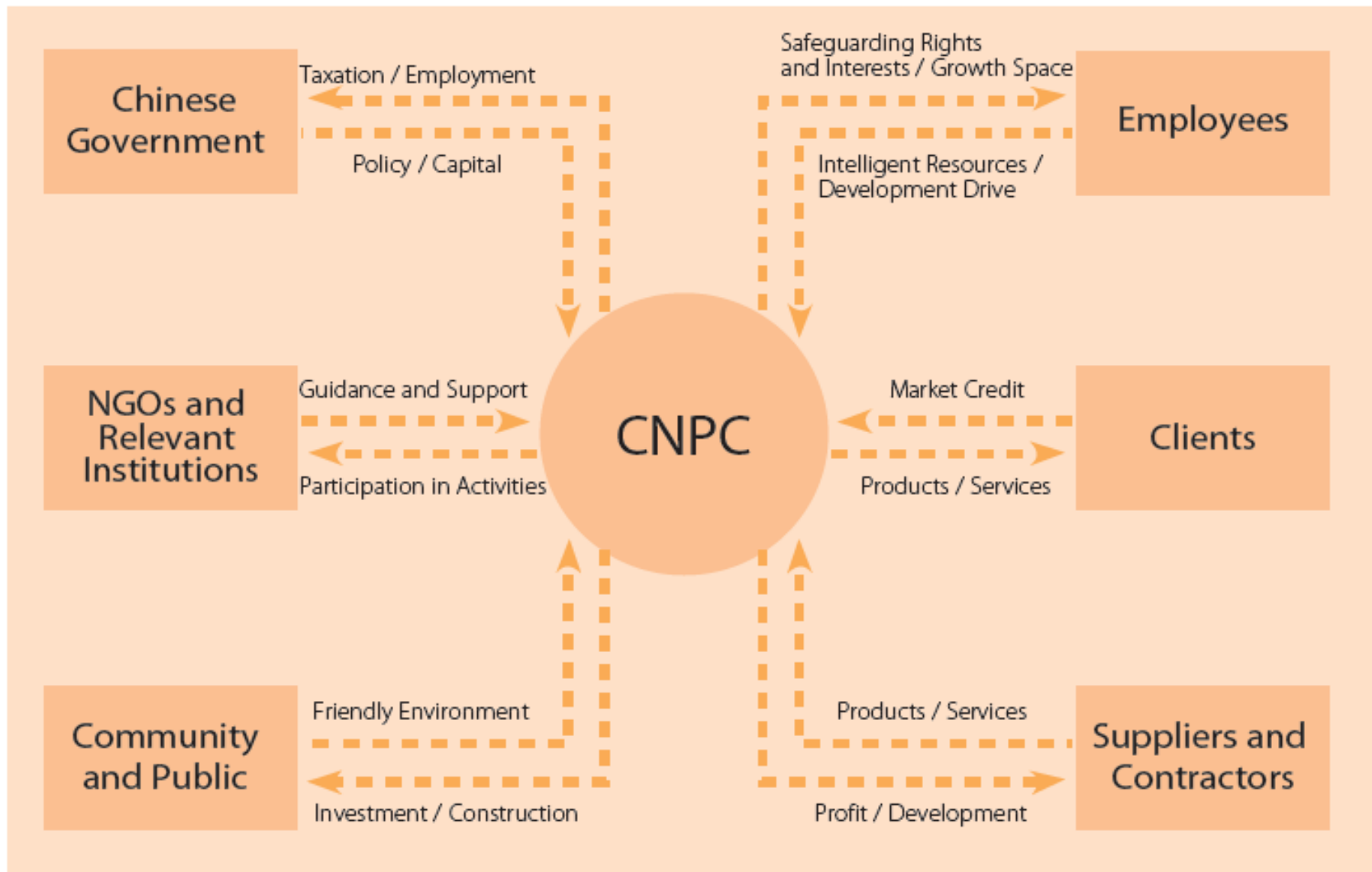

# Overseas Corporate Social Responsibility Concepts

## ■ Obtaining business opportunities in a legitimate way ———

Oppose to graft and corruptions in any form and oppose to obtaining business opportunities through any inappropriate ways in the course of its overseas development.

Require all employees involved in overseas business to observe the Code of Conduct for Commercial Activities and Business Ethics of the Company.

## ■ Developing resources in a reasonable manner ———

Meet the requirements for sustainable development of the oil and gas industry in host countries, reject any destructive exploitation of oil and gas resources, implement advanced standards and best practice of the industry, minimize the impact and protect environment in operating regions.

## ■ Pursuing a win-win relationship with stakeholders ———

Respect the rights and interests of stakeholders such as host countries, partners, contractors, employees and local residents; pursue a win-win relationship with stakeholders by supporting their reasonable supervision of business related to their interests.



## Education and Culture

From 2008 to 2009, CNOOC SES Ltd. had further stepped up its effort to support the education and culture of the local communities.

The support actions the Company took to improve local education causes include providing career guidance for senior high schools around the operation regions; providing scholarships to students living near operation regions and providing economic support and assistance in improving their education levels. There are more than 100 beneficiaries consisting of students from primary schools, secondary schools and senior high schools, and colleges; sponsoring local scouting activities and donating books and information materials to local libraries. In 2008 the Company also donated US\$ 84,520 in educational and cultural activities.

## Involvement in Community Environmental Program

While sticking to a high standard of environmental protection during the operations, CNOOC SES Ltd. has actively participated in environmental programs of local communities.

In 2008 and 2009, the Company cooperated with local non-governmental organizations to hold 140,000 mangrove seeds plantation around operation regions to prevent abrasion and preserve the local environment.

To better maintain and conserve the local marine environment, CNOOC SES Ltd. also partnered with an Indonesian environmental protection organization to launch a rehabilitation program for the coral reef ecosystem. The program includes the culture of coral reef, submarine transplantation, fish conservation, etc. This program has boosted the conservation and management of coral reefs and further improved submarine environmental resources.

## Renovation of Public Facilities

As a company with respect for the religious belief of the local residence during 2008 – 2009, CNOOC SES Ltd. donated US\$ 20,000 to help the local community renovate three mosques, which were primary premises for local Muslims to carry out religious activities.
